These days my late father-in-law is quite present to me. Each year he looked forward to switching the clock to daylight saving time. We were hardly in the new year when he would tell us often, with a big smile, "it is getting lighter every day."

I am with him. Each year I welcome spring and even though snow still covers a good part of our back yard, I enjoy the rays of sun reaching my desk and the days that are getting longer. I have been starving for light lately. There has been a lot of darkness this winter and I am not just talking about a seasonal lack of sunshine.

The suffering of the people in Ukraine and Iran have cast dark clouds on the world as well as economic worries about a global recession. Sometimes I wish we could simply turn a switch to reset the world into a better place. Sometimes I need someone to simply remind me that "it is getting lighter every day."

It's one of the reasons why I am looking forward to Easter. Easter reminds us of a hope that is brighter than the darkness around us. ## **Congregation Communication**

#### **Cathy Calvin, Chair, Trinity Board of Directors**

Trinity's Annual General Meeting (AGM) was held on February 26, 2023, after the Sunday service. A brief synopsis of some of the agenda items are outlined below.

We welcomed John Schuurman from Flourish, which is the real estate development division of Indwell. John presented information about Indwell including what they are all about and their work in the City of Hamilton and other areas. He also talked about the King Street site and why it is so attractive for Indwell as a potential housing site. He explained that likely most of the existing church would be preserved and utilized as common space as well as housing units. More units would be built onto the back of the existing building. The location of King Street is ideal for those who rely on public transit and the fact that there is shopping, a bank and a pharmacy across the street. The area for the gardens that exist is most attractive too.

The following motion was brought forth from the board:

"Motion that the following recommendation from the Trinity Board be considered. Trinity Board proposes the remediation of the Fennell Avenue site to be used as the alternative worship site during the renovations of the Hughson Street site. And further, that the Board pursues the sale of the King Street site to Indwell. Moved and seconded by the Trinity Board of Directors."

The motion was carried by a vote of 99 Yes and 2 No drawn from the inperson attendees, Zoom poll and phone-in votes.

A second motion was brought forward from the Trinity Board:

"Motion that Trinity provides an interest free loan of up to \$40,000 to Eucharist Church. This amount is to be paid back monthly over 5 years and Eucharist would incur any legal costs associated with this transaction. Moved and seconded by Trinity Board of Directors."

An explanation of the condition of Eucharist's building and current fundraising was outlined, and the vote was called. The motion was carried by a vote of 87 Yes and 12 No from the in-person attendees, Zoom poll and phone-in votes.

#### **Congregation Communication continued**

Mike Schuster of the Redevelopment Working Group also presented a quick report of what they were doing. They have contacted four architectural firms and have met virtually with all of them. The firms will be providing proposals for a feasibility study. The committee will evaluate these proposals to bring one of them to the congregation for cost approval. It is anticipated it will take 6 to 9 months for the feasibility study to be completed, with renovations beginning sometime in 2024.

Since the AGM, we have received news of the retirement of Pastor Loretta Jaunzarins, which will happen in June. We thank her for all the contributions she has made to the life of Trinity congregation before, during and after amalgamation. We wish her all the best for continued good health, joy, and success on her new life's journey as she enters retirement. Pastor Loretta's last Sunday with us will be June 4<sup>th</sup>.



On Thursday March 23, Trinity hosted a "Round Table Community Gathering" that included 12 representatives of various agencies and churches.

Some of these included Good Shepherd, Wesley Urban Ministries, Aging in Community, Christ Cathedral, Eucharist Church and St. Patrick's Church.

The gathering also included 12 members from Trinity. The discussion focused on the needs of the neighbourhood and the roles our respective organization plays in it.



- The most urgent community needs
- What the challenges include
- What should be done
- How can community organizations and churches help to respond to those needs

The reoccurring theme from all discussion groups was the housing crisis in Hamilton. This included shelter, transitional and supportive housing, and housing affordability. The range of demographics included young families, newcomers, individuals and seniors. It was noted that even people who used to be considered financially stable can easily be only one step away from a crisis. Factors such as high rental costs play a big part in added financial strain.

High cost and lack of housing are compounded by other issues such as food insecurity and health problems, all which all need to be addressed. This resonates with the vision and values we as Trinity have identified as a focus of our ministries.

In the course of our discussions it became obvious that we need to work on multiple levels. We need to do as much as we can on the small individual level and also work together as a community to advocate on a political (municipal, provincial and federal) level.

The atmosphere of the meeting was positive and productive. All who came were engaged in the discussions and were eager to learn and willing work together. Many of the community and church groups expressed their gratitude to be able to meet in a wider circle and exchange ideas. All agreed that it is important to build relationships, work together and hopefully meet again.

"I leave with hope" was one of the final comments.


## **Celtic Spirituality**

Hoi Yee Tiffany Yuen has learned to trust God to guide her through the challenges of her life.

She arrived in Canada on November 6, 2022. This wasn't her first time in our country. In 2019, she participated in an exchange program at the University of Saskatchewan. She had already learned to speak English through school in Hong Kong, but her experience in Canada made her more adept with the language. Back home, she majored in Social Work, which led her to work with kindergarten-aged children and their parents.

So why would she leave her parents, sister, and a job she loved to move to Canada? Well, let's look at the situation in Hong Kong.

On July 1, 1997, Hong Kong was returned to China after being governed by Great Britain since WWII. While under British rule, they didn't follow communism and had a more westernized lifestyle. The agreement with China



was that they would remain unchanged for 50 years. However, only 25 years later, citizens started protesting about losing their freedoms. In June 2019, people rallied up again, this time about the Extradition Bill which stated that Hong Kong citizens charged with crimes would be tried and would serve sentences on the mainland.

Communism was becoming more and more a part of life in Hong Kong but Tiffany seemed to stay ahead of the curve. She was born just two years after the change to Chinese rule and schools still supported independent thinking while she was a child. Tiffany graduated from university in 2021. This was the last year students didn't have to take National Security Law courses, which is a means to infiltrate communistic thinking into the society.

Tiffany was vacationing in Europe when the protests started about the Extradition Bill. When she returned home she participated in the uprising. It was a very eye-opening experience. When the police violently broke up the protests, Tiffany tasted teargas, heard a gun go off, and saw people being arrested and injured. This situation made her realize that she didn't want to build her future life in a place without freedom and security.

Canada became her choice since she already had an experience here. After a Google search for "the most liveable cities in Canada", she decided on Hamilton. She was crushed when she wasn't accepted at any Canadian universities, thinking that school was her pathway to leave her country. She was hoping that God was going to show her how she was going to make her move a reality. He gave her an answer by way of a work visa!

Once that decision was made, everything fell smoothly into place. She found herself an affordable apartment in the Durand neighbourhood and got a job at a daycare centre. She enjoys working with children and feels that God has put her in the right place at the right time.

Soon after she made the move to Hamilton, she was looking for a Lutheran church to attend. Tiffany's mom had taken her to a Lutheran church while she was growing up. A Google search led her to Trinity Lutheran Church. Tiffany feels welcomed at Trinity. When I asked her what she likes best about our church, she answered, "the coffee hours!"

I'm reading the book "Living to 100". It's full of stories and tips from people who have lived to be 100+ years of age. It seems that both good physical and mental health are key to living into your 90's and beyond. Physical and mental exercise are important on a daily basis, as well as diet and avoiding things like high cholesterol foods, alcohol and smoking.

The late Dr. Struick was a mathematician who lived until he was 106 years old. What kept him going was continuing to lecture well past 100 years of age. He was able to preserve his cognitive functions by continuing to learn new mathematical concepts and then explaining those concepts to other people through his writing and lectures.

Last fall Ellen Ryan and I led a workshop on writing your Ethical Will and Legacy Letters. According to the authors of "Living to 100," this type of thinking and writing is an excellent workout for your brain. It is also a great way to evaluate your life and if you are a younger senior over sixty it is a great way to decide how you want to spend your future. Here are some themes to start with if you are interested in doing this:

- Write about major transitions in your life like leaving home, going to college/university, fighting in a war, having a child.
- Write about your family of origin, your current family, noting family history, traditions, tragedies and triumphs.
- What was your major life work or career? Have you done volunteer work?
- Write about your health, detailing your health history and include exercise, diet, and other elements.
- Write about the loves you had in your life, both current and in past.
- What about your friends and other social relationships? Describe who these people are, why they're important to you, and their special qualities.
- What have been your leisure activities and hobbies?
- What have the role of the arts or literature played in your life?
- What role did faith or spirituality play in your life?
- Write about your experience with dealing with stress or the death of someone close to you.

We are changing our focus and requesting members to consider supporting the **Trinity Refugee Ministry**. Trinity and seven other churches in southeastern Ontario have committed to raising funds that will cover a year of support for two Liberian refugee families.

Once this money is raised, CLWR will apply to bring these 11 people to the Hamilton area. These families had been working towards peace and reconciliation in post-war Liberia and the Liberian government views them as a threat.

They have been living in exile in West Africa and the fathers and older children have been threatened and have experienced violence. One of the father's relatives was mistaken for him and the relative was killed. These families live in constant fear for their safety.

Thanks to some very generous donations, Trinity has raised \$33,875 toward our goal of \$40,000. Please consider supporting the Trinity Refugee Ministry.

Any money raised above \$40,000 will be used to cover start-up costs once the families arrive in Hamilton.
